Walking on Wangal Country

The northern border of Burwood Council is Parramatta Road, which was the original journey way for generations of First Nations Peoples. Particularly, Eora and Darug Peoples travelled the corridor inland from the coast to collect resources and meet for social and ceremonial gatherings. This pathway represents the connection and travel of generations of people.

The southernmost point of Burwood Council is the Cooks River, which stretches inland to the Parramatta River, known as Burramattagal in Dharug, meaning *Place of the eels*. Traces of the Wangal People's practices and use of the river are still evident in middens and rock shelters which can be found along the waterways today. The river represents an important source of life and connection for generations of people.

Burwood Council beginnings

The municipality of Burwood was first incorporated by proclamation in the Government Gazette on 27 March, 1874. The first council was elected on 9 June 1874 which was then a quiet village consisting of 1200 people and about 300 buildings. In 2024 Burwood Municipality will celebrate its sesquicentenary; 150 years.

Updating our image and identity

The Burwood logo was redesigned in 2019 to reflect the vibrant diversity of the community and lifestyle within the LGA. The new design is based on the letter 'B' and divided into six parts for the suburbs of the area.



The bright colour palette represents priorities identified by residents: harmony and friendship (pink), trust and stability (light blue), creativity and vibrancy (orange), heritage and heart (red), the natural environment (green) and energy and optimism (yellow). The typography pays homage to the area's rich heritage, having been inspired by earlier Burwood logos.

Housing

- **45.2%** of housing is an apartment or flat in a three storey or higher block, compared to **27.1%** in Greater Sydney.
- **27.4%** of households were made up of couples with children.
- The average household size is **2.7** persons.
- 91.5% of private dwellings are occupied.
- Between 2016-2021 lone person households in Burwood Council increased by 816 households to 21.7%

- In 2020/21, household expenditure on utilities was **\$3,214**.
- Median weekly household income is **\$1,867**.
- **\$500** is the weekly median rent.
- Median monthly mortgage repayments are **\$2,500**.

Education

- There are **8** primary schools and **10** high schools in the Burwood LGA.
- In Burwood 34.6% of people were attending an educational institution at the time of the 2021 Census.
 5.2% of the Burwood Coucnil population were in primary school, 5.1% in secondary school and 14.4% in a tertiary or

technical institution.

 In the Burwood Council area,
 72.5% of people aged over 15 years had completed Year 12 schooling (or equivalent) as of 2021. This percentage is higher than across Greater Sydney.



 A larger percentage of persons attend university who live in Burwood Council (10.4%) compared to Australia as a whole (4.7%)

Population change

- Burwood LGA is projected to grow by **41%** (or 1.7% per year) from 2021-2041; the fastest annual growth rate within Easter Harbour City.
- The population of Burwood LGA in 2001 was 30,393 and is projected to reach 58,178 by 2041. This is a growth of 91.4% in a space of forty years; almost double.
