Council is pleased to support three of the Art Prize awards: Artwork of the Year to the value of \$5,000, the New and Emerging Artist to the value of \$2,500 and the People's Choice to the value of \$1,000. Council is proud to be acquiring the Artist of the Year and New and Emerging prize artworks, to be showcased in one of Council's facilities after the event.

I would also like to acknowledge this year's Judging Panel for handling the challenging task of choosing the winners with conviction, passion and integrity: Jenny Cheeseman, Head of Curatorial, Casula Powerhouse Centre; Norma Tahhan, Internationally acclaimed artist and Owner/Director of Gallery NTK, Croydon and Talia Smith, Public Programs Officer at Peacock Gallery, Auburn.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the Council staff who have made this event possible.

Awards

Artwork of the Year (\$5,000 acquisitive prize)

Awarded to the most outstanding artwork overall as decided by the judging panel.

New And Emerging Artist (\$2,500 acquisitive prize)

Awarded to the most outstanding artwork as decided by the judges. To qualify for this category, the artist must meet the following requirements:

- a) Be under 18 years of age (as at 29 March 2019), OR
- b) Not had an artwork hung in a professional prize or competition and gallery or exhibition, and not sold an artwork to a gallery or private space.

People's Choice (\$1,000 non-acquisitive prize)

Visitors to the exhibition will be invited to vote for their favourite artwork. The artwork receiving the most votes will win this award.

Judges

Jenny Cheeseman

Head of Curatorial, Casula Powerhouse Centre

Jenny has been in her current role since April 2018 with a remit to develop exhibitions for the diverse local Liverpool audience and artists. She has over 15 years of industry experience, working previously at Auburn/Cumberland Council for over 7 years as Arts Coordinator and Peacock Gallery Director delivering the exhibition and public program for the gallery, public art projects and supporting the development and presentation across art forms by local artists and community groups and organisations. She previously freelanced as a curator and from 2004-2007 ran a Western Sydney based Art Agency representing over 30 artists with associated pop-up gallery spaces. She has postgraduate Art Management qualifications from University of Technology Sydney.

Norma Tahhan

Internationally acclaimed artist and Owner/Director of Gallery NTK, Croydon

Norma Tahhan is a Sydney based artist who has gained an extensive knowledge of drawing and painting, through various Universities and Colleges. She has undertaken many travels within Australia and abroad for artistic research and this is reflected in her many art works. After numerous exhibitions, including sell out Solo exhibitions at The Seymour Theatre Centre, The Star, The New England Regional Art Museum and Customs House, it is clear that Tahhan's artistic practice is dedicated, professional and consistent. Her work has been represented in numerous Private and Corporate Collections throughout Australia, USA, Europe, Lebanon and New Zealand. Tahhan's work has been featured in many newspapers and publications including The Sydney Morning Herald, Daily Telegraph, Black & White and on television. Tahhan's work was recently featured in the Channel 9 Mini Series "Bite Club". Her works have also been selected and featured at the Powerhouse Museum, The National Maritime Museum and the Australian Centre of Photography. Norma founded Gallery NTK, Croydon in 1996 which is an exciting Art Hub featuring an Art Gallery, Art School and Art Café. Gallery NTK remains the studio for Tahhan's art practice.

Talia Smith

Public Programs Officer, Peacock Gallery, Auburn

Talia Smith is an artist and curator of Samoan, Cook Island and New Zealand European heritage. Originally from New Zealand she is now based in Sydney, Australia. Her visual arts and curatorial practice explores concepts around time, memory, dislocation and ruin. She has exhibited and curated shows at artist run and public galleries in Australia, New Zealand and internationally. Her most recent curatorial projects include More than all the ocean between us at Artspace Ideas Platform and Here is your Horizon at Cement Fondu and her most recent solo show titled Monuments to Moments at Verge Gallery Sydney. Smith is the founder and co-director of ARI Cold Cuts, was Runway Australian Experimental Art's Chair from 2016-18, 2017's Firstdraft emerging curator and 2018's Artbank emerging curator. She currently works as Public Programs Officer at Cumberland Council's Peacock Gallery. She is also currently undertaking her MFA by research at UNSW Sydney.



The Bird of Paradise depicted in the artwork has been inspired by a variation of Mandela's Gold. My appreciation and tribute to Mandela, the hero of my country.





I painted this older style work with a more contemporary feel, in mono tones.





Using basic scientific principle to demonstrate science is within art – art is within science.




An abstract depiction of the natural landscape and flora found in our local Wangal Park Burwood.


